

Plan

- Continuity of flowing planar geometry between the Memorial and the proposed plaza
- Creation of a Sacred Space by using the surrounding elements of benches, storytelling walls, plantings and four new trees to enfold the space
- Provision of on grade accessibility to Memorial
- Focus of the Memorial view shed to the second span of the Walnut Street Bridge
- Continuity of Memorial downslope utilizing Those As Yet Unsung and planting
